Analog video security system

Cameras on a modern analog CCTV system send their video in the traditional base band format over coax or UTP cabling back to a digital video recorder (DVR). Here, video is digitized and stored on hard drives. Most modern DVRs are a network device, and as such can be accessed remotely from the LAN, or with the proper configuration, from across a WAN or the internet. There are no tapes to change (C. Stauffer, W.E.L. Grimson, 2007).

Internet Protocol video security system

IP video cameras broadcast their video as a digital stream over an IP network. Like an analog system, video is recorded on hard drives, but since the video is an IP stream straight from the camera, there is more flexibility as to how and where that video is recorded. The DVR is replaced with an NVR (network video recorder), which in some cases is just software since it doesn't need to convert analog to digital. Video footage can then be stored on new or existing network RAID drives as directed by the NVR software (I. Haritaoglu, D. Harwood, L.S. Davis, 2009).

Benefit of Internet Protocol Surveillance System

One of the biggest factors driving interest in IP video systems is the high resolution that they can offer. Analog cameras max out on resolution at about 580 TVL which equates to roughly 0.4 mega pixels. High end IP cameras on the other hand, are currently available at resolutions above five mega pixels. This high resolution in turn gives users the ability to zoom in on video after the fact, and still have usable video (www.ipcamera.support.com).

LITERATURE REVIEW

MOTION DETECTION

Motion detection is the most commonly technique use nowadays. This is because their usage in many areas like video surveillance systems, traffic monitoring, gesture recognition, advanced user interfaces, sport games players tracking etc. All these applications are to identify the object of interest. (H. Tao, H.S. Sawhney, R. Kumar, 2011).

The popular optical flow technique; Horn and Schunck are a combination of the gradient constraint with a global smoothness term to be smooth in the edge region, the speed of which always sharp changes, so the edge shape of the object easily distorts to constrain the velocity field. As for the region matching it rely on determining the correspondence between the two images, by matching blocks of the other (J. Renno, D. Greenhill, J. Orwell and G.A., 2012)

By using optical flow also can detect a multiple motion in a frame because it is calculated based on the velocity of the particular object. Base on this characteristic, it can be used to extract the candidate region based on matching optical flow values (J. Renno, and D. Greenhill, 2009).

As for temporal difference, it computes the difference between two or three consecutive frames. It is good at adapting to the dynamic environments, but generally poor at extracting enough relevant feature pixels, which resulting holes are generated in the moving object and cannot detect the entire shape of a moving object with uniform intensity (B.A. Boghossian, 2009).

DISTANTLY EVENTS SURVEILLANCE

IP-based camera used in a remote monitoring station for intelligent image processing. In order to provide enhanced security, events need to be integrated with a command and control system capable of effectively responding to hundreds of events per day in a busy, critical infrastructure facility. Other than IP-based camera, pan, tilt, and zoom (PTZ) camera also can be used in remote monitoring. The PTZ itself may refer to the feature for the security camera. It also can be used to describe an entire category of cameras where a combination of sound and/or motion and/or change in heat signature may enable the camera to activate, focus and track suspected changes in the video field (S.A. Velastin, B. Boghossian, B. Lo, J. Sun, M.A, 2009).

AUTHENTIC TIME DISCOVERY

Motion features are derived from the motion vectors. Relying on motion vectors rather than on pixel data reduces the input data rate by about two orders of magnitude, and allows real-time operation on limited computational platforms (S.A. Velastin, 2010).

To perform this method in real-time and with high accuracy, we design every block carefully. Since the consecutive temporal difference approach requires no background model and little

memory, this approach is quite efficient and accurate in that it has a low computational cost and it adapts quickly to the changes of the background (M. Valera, S.A. Velastin, 2009).

SYSTEM NETWORK

There are two types of cameras in the monitored site. One is the global camera, which captures the global view of interest. The other is tracking cameras, controlled by VMS server to track the intruders. In order to keep the recorded images safely, the captured images are stored in a VMS server as well as VMS DB server. In the case users request real time image monitoring, the system connects to the VMS Server. On the other hand, the system connects to the VMS DB server if users query stored images (<http://www.prismatica.com>).

A network-based visual intelligent surveillance system is mainly composed of cameras, client computers, a server computer and a HUB. The clients include video capture module, change detection module, classification module and network sending module. The server includes network listening & receiving module, camera analysis module, a digital monitor and log & image database. The video capture Module on each client can capture video sequence from four cameras. So, there are four clients in all. - iv- Fixed practice of invigilation involves a lot man power.

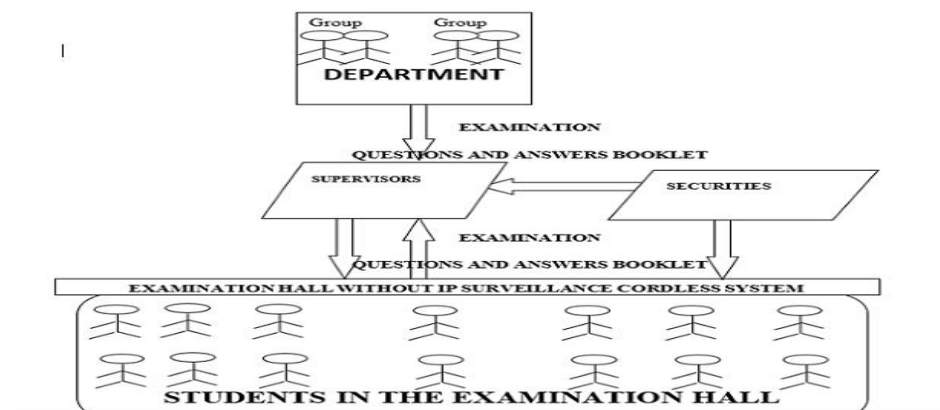


Figure 1: Existing System Data Flow Diagram

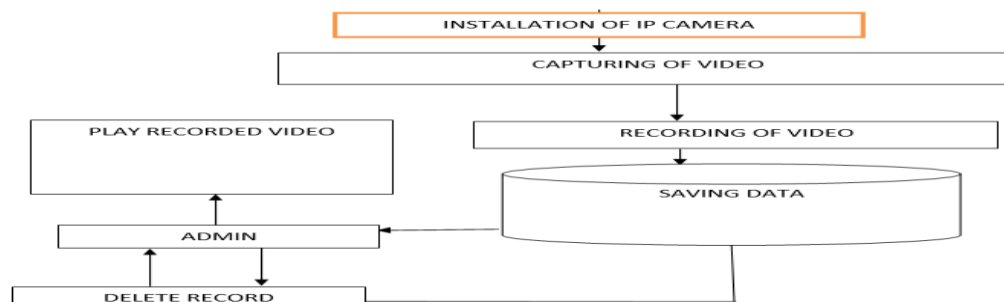


Figure 2: New System Data Flow Diagram.

The interface indicated available ports for connections, the camera supported wired and wireless port for connection / configuration option suitable for the human ware.

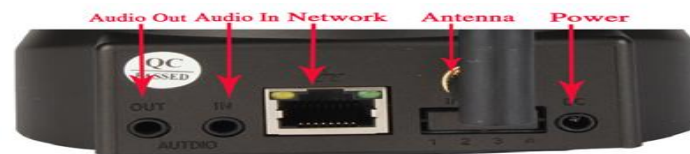


Figure 5: Back view of an IP Camera

- i. Connecting the camera to the local network
- ii. Power on the camera in close proximity to the router
- iii. Directly connect the camera to the router using the Ethernet cable.
- iv. If the yellow and green indicator lights on the camera are blinking, then the camera is successfully communicating with the router.
- v. Insert the software CD included into the PC.
- vi. Run the program labeled “OCX Setup” form the file folder on the software CD.
- vii. After the “OCX Setup” program has installed. Please run the “Search Tool” software. This software is used to search the IP address of the IP camera in the local network.

Note: “Search Tool” Software don't need to installed, if needed, it can copy it to the desktop of the PC.

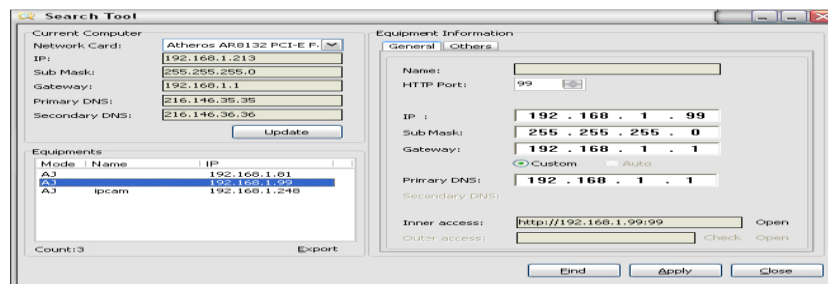


Figure 8: Search Tool Interface

- viii. Click “Find” to find the IP Camera on the router. (If there are several items on the router, check the bottom of the camera for the factory IP setting.)

From the Search Tool, Select the IP camera. Here, it is needed to re-address the camera’s IP address based off of the Local Network Default Gateway. For example: If the Default Gateway is 192.168.1.1, change the last set of values of the address from 1 to a larger value such as 99. Therefore, the new address will read “192.168.1.99” (The last set of values must be lower than 254).

- ix. Next, change the Gateway and DNS IP address in the network setting to exactly match your Default Gateway.
- x. Now Change the Data Port to 80.
- xi. Last click “Apply” enter the Username and Password. The Username will be “admin” and the Password field will remain empty.
- xii. Last, click “OK” and your camera will automatically reboot as it saves all changes that you have just made.

Prompting the Necessary ActiveX Controls

The first time the camera is access online from a computer, the three necessary ActiveX controls needs to be prompt.

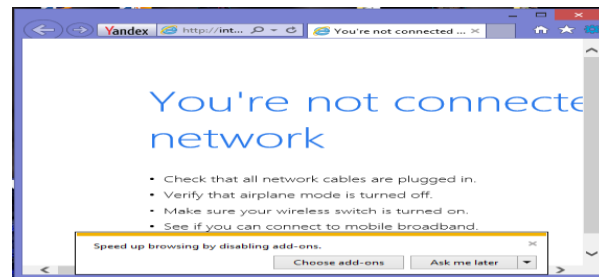


Figure 9: Home Page OF Internet Explorer

- Click on “Tools”

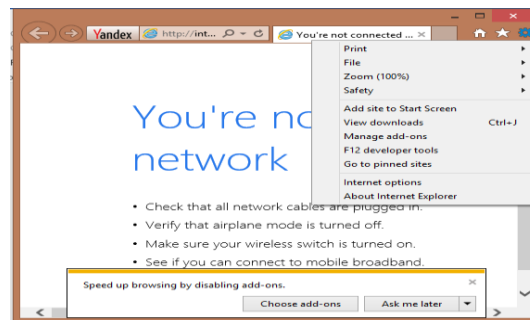


Figure 10: Internet Explorer Tools Dialog Box

- Select “Internet Options.”

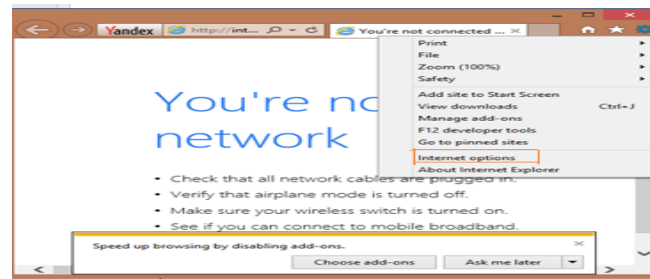


Figure 11: Internet Explorer Tools Dialog Box

- Select the “Security” tab

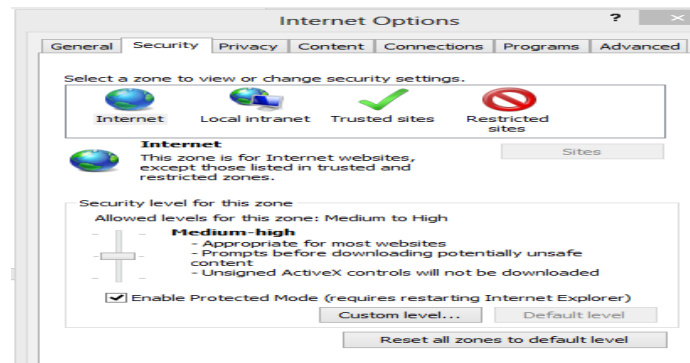


Figure 12: Internet Options

- Then click the “Custom Level”

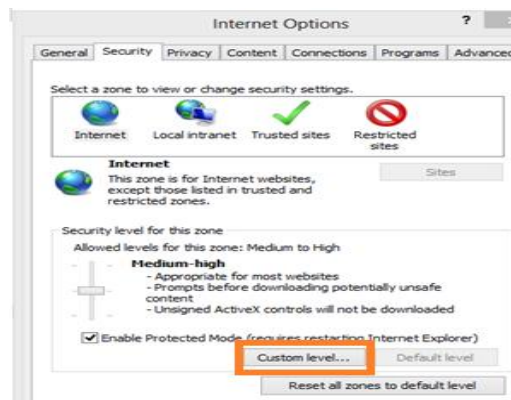


Figure 13: Internet Options

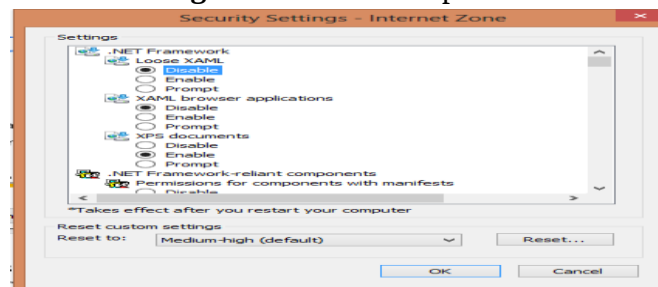


Figure 14: Security Settings – Internet Zone

- Initialize and script ActiveX controls not marked as safe for scripting.

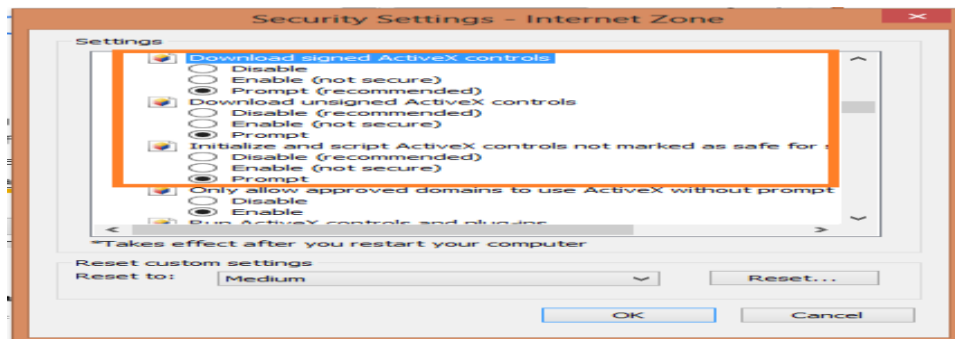


Figure 15: Security Settings – Internet Zone

This will usually prompt or a bar may appear on the top of the page. If prompted, select run or install. Click on the yellow bar to proceed.

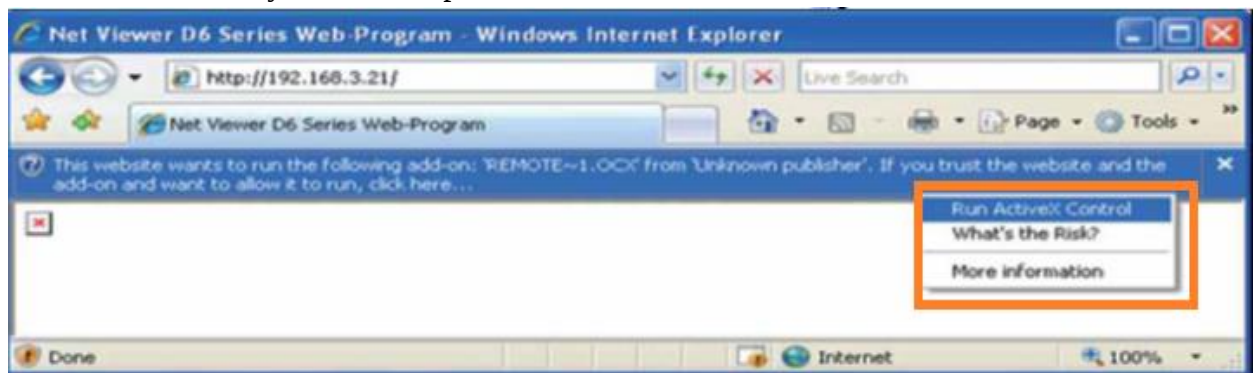


Figure 16: Run ActiveX Control

- a. To access the camera from a local connection, open an Internet Explorer browser. In the browser, type Http://192.168.1.99

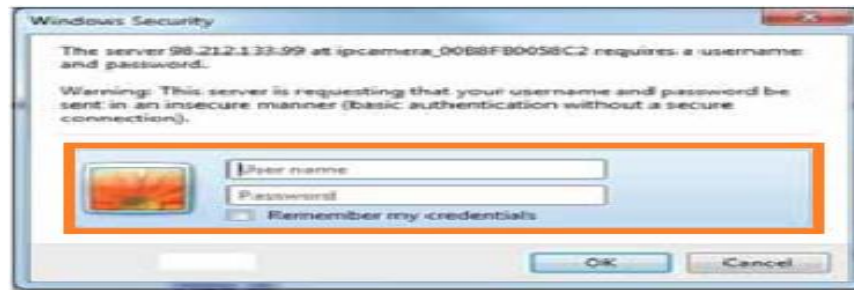


Figure 17: Window for User's Login Details And Password.

- a. While the camera is still connected directly to a router with an Ethernet cable, go to the Wireless LAN Settings section on the camera's menu.
- b. Click 'Scan' to search for available wireless networks.

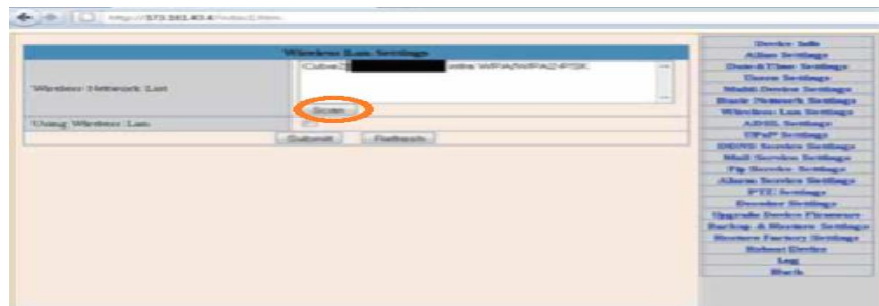


Figure 18: Interface To Search For Available Wireless Networks

Once the wireless network is selected, enter the wireless network's password into the "Shared Key" field.

- c. After the submit button is click the camera will automatically reboot to save these settings. Please wait 30 seconds after the camera has rebooted, then disconnect the Ethernet cable that is connecting the camera to the router.
- d. The camera will now be successfully communicating wirelessly with the wireless router.
